- 20,000 Homes Campaign beats goal to house 20,000 of Canada's most vulnerable homeless people
- 20KHomes Results Infographic
- On March 6th Built for Zero Canada launches after communities house 21,254 of Canada's most vulnerable homeless population

Between June 2015 and February 2019, 38 communities participating in the 20,000 Homes Campaign house 21,254 of the most vulnerable people experiencing homelessness

On March 6, 2019 20KHomes relaunched as Built for Zero Canada



Built for Zero Canada is an ambitious national change effort helping a core group of leading communities end chronic homelessness — a first step on the path to eliminating all homelessness in Canada.





Reaching Home & BFZ-C

- Reaching Home <u>Directives</u> (April 2019)
- New chronic homelessness definition
 - New definition not yet required by Reaching Home but will be included in PiT 2020 and HIFIS
 - BFZ-C has adopted this new definition see BFZ-C updated Functional Zero Q&A
 - BFZ-C recognizes transition to new definition will take time conducting a chronic homelessness definitions check-in over summer 2019 with Collaborative communities
- Requirement for BNL & CAS
 - Requirement under Reaching Home to implement by March 2022
 - BFZ-C updating Coordinated Access Scorecard to include and align with Reaching Home minimum requirements
 - BFZ-C updating Provider Participation Tool to include column to capture Reaching Home funded programs
 - BFZ-C created <u>Coordinated Access Policies and Procedures Checklist</u> for quick alignment check in
- HIFIS 4 or other HMIS
 - Required under Reaching Home under Coordinated Access to implement by March 2022
 - Support in BFZ-C to implement BNL/CAS into HIFIS 4 working with ACRE Consulting and federal HIFIS
- Reaching Home funding BNL/CAS TTA through CAEH for BFZ-C and Non-BFZ-C

Application Process Highlights

- Applications due June 28 submitted to marie@caeh.ca
- Applications consist of a Word document (link in PDF) with seven questions requiring written explanations and two questions requiring you to check boxes:
 - #8 indicating inclusion of completed scorecards and data
 - #9 indicating your understanding and/or commitment to a number of items
- Decisions will be made by the CAEH team and communities informed by July 19 up to 8 new communities are anticipated to be added to the BFZ-C Collaborative
- Agreement signed by Sept 1 and payment by Sept 30 to confirm spot agreement for Sept 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020. Ability to renew for July 2020 to March 2022
- Orientation and on-boarding will take place over the fall of 2019
- First Learning Session January 2020





Who is Eligible to Apply

- Canadian communities ©
- Communities who have been part of 20KHomes/BFZ-C Self-Directed Option
- Communities who were part of the 20KHomes Campaign at one point and then decided to step out for the time-being
- Communities who are brand new to 20KHomes/BFZ-C
- A body that has a lead role in organizing their communities efforts towards ending homelessness





What Are We Looking For?

- Communities that know what they are getting into with BFZ-C and still want to be involved
- Communities that want to focus on ending chronic homelessness & want to use the BFZ-C functional zero chronic definition to measure their progress (for the purposes of BFZ-C)
- Communities who are really excited about being part of BFZ-C learning from and sharing with other BFZ-C communities, using a structured approach that begins with achieving a quality By-Name List, using and having access to the BFZ-C tools, resources and coaching supports
- Preference for communities that are already undertaking strong efforts to end homelessness and can become early proof-points showing that reductions and an end to chronic homelessness is possible as the beginning of the end of all homelessness in Canada.
 - Leading communities early adopters looking to accelerate their change efforts those who have been implementing promising practices e.g. Registry Weeks, By-Name Lists, Coordinated Access, Housing First, Diversion, HMIS etc. - becoming housing-focussed and data-informed systems.
 - Communities with strong and clear leadership
 - Communities that are ready to go by end of September





Costs

- Same participation fee regardless of when joined between June 2018 to June 2020. Greater value the earlier joined.
- Sliding scale based on community size:
 - Communities with population's of 500,000+ who are Reaching Home largest funded communities \$15,000
 - Communities with populations of 350,000+ \$7,500
 - Communities with populations of less than 350,000 \$2,500
 - Communities who are not yet Reaching Home designated \$0
- Covers a fraction of the costs for participating. In the US pay \$10,000 US/per year regardless of size – which is still a fraction of the cost. If fee is a barrier to participating – talk to us.
- Must pay own travel, accommodations and dinners for Learning Sessions
- Time
- Commitment now guarantees a spot for 2020-2022 should you be fully participating and wish to continue. Will have sign-up for July 2020 – March 2022 beginning in early 2020 at same participation costs as above.



To achieve a Quality By-Name List, communities must:

- Receive an 11/11 for basic quality on the BNL Scorecard 2.0. Keep working toward a 12/12 for advanced quality!
- Complete worksheets demonstrating provider participation and progress toward development of a By-Name List
- Submit three consecutive months of reliable chronic By-Name List data:
- o Submitted data includes all 6 data points (active homeless, move-ins, moved to inactive,inflow, returned from inactive, and returned from housing)
- o Data reliability is measured using a 15% or less margin of error between the number of active homeless over the last three-month period compared to the net monthly change

Monthly Reporting Rulers

- Monthly Reporting Rulers is a way for communities to celebrate their progress in reporting data.
- Its purpose is to demonstrate the linear progression of data improvement from the most basic form of reporting (*Chronic Move-Ins*) to the ideal form of reporting (*Quality Balanced Data*).
- In order to move up a level in the pyramid, a community must first have achieved the preceding level(s).
- Communities may achieve multiple titles at once if they have met the definition of each level in the same time period.
 - For example, if a community is able to submit data that meets the definition of Chronic Move-Ins, Some Chronic Inflow / Outflow, and Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow at the same time, then that community will achieve all three levels at the same time.



A community is in the "Home Stretch" if they have:


- Data projections 6 months of Quality By-Name List data AND are projected to achieve chronic functional zero within 12 months (in conversation with community)
- Proximity to the functional zero threshold (three or less active chronic homeless)
- Active and engaged with BFZ-C supports
- High functioning local leadership team
- Leaders with the interest and will to push towards
 Functional Zero in the immediate term

- BNL Scorecard focus is on adding to and updating the BNL and quality of data

CAS SCORECARD

eas Scorecard is focussed on effective CAS operation and matching housing interventions to people on the CAS list

HOUSING RESOURCE LIST (HRL) SCORECARD

- Focussed on having a quality list of <u>all</u> housing resources and interventions in a community
- HRL Scorecard to be focussed on the quality of mapping, and managing of housing interventions data
