




The Opening Plenary at the March 6 Learning Session is going to double as a press conference. We want the spotlight on the great work from our communities.

Wrapping up the campaign and launching Built for Zero Canada is an important opportunity to get the word out about your work and build support for ending homelessness.

This means the morning of March 6 is going to be busy–we will be sending out newsletters, emailing our press release and posting across our social media platforms in an effort to get your story and your work trending!

And we're going to need your help





We want to take advantage of this opportunity to:

- Build support for BFZ-C (X/#/\$)
- Build support for community efforts (X/#/\$)
- Build public and political support for ending homelessness (X/#/\$)

To achieve these goals we need your help – volume of messaging is important.

- Promote on social media and (1) highlight local participation (2) mobilize your networks (3) ping influencers (4) promote with politicians






New Reporting Form: April 2019

- We are...
 - Scaling back on the number of questions
 - Focusing on chronic data only
- You still can...
 - Collect data that is important to your community and your progress
- In the future...
 - You will have the option to submit other data sets for visualization



Monthly Reporting Rulers

- Monthly Reporting Rulers is a way for communities to celebrate their progress in reporting data.
- Its purpose is to demonstrate the linear progression of data improvement from the most basic form of reporting (*Chronic Move-Ins*) to the ideal form of reporting (*Quality Balanced Data*).
- In order to move up a level in the pyramid, a community must first have achieved the preceding level(s).
- Communities may achieve multiple titles at once if they have met the definition of each level in the same time period.
 - For example, if a community is able to submit data that meets the definition of *Chronic Move-Ins, Some Chronic Inflow / Outflow,* and *Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow* at the same time, then that community will achieve all three levels at the same time.



Chronic Move-Ins

Definition

- Move-Ins means that someone experiencing chronic homelessness has be housed in permanent and/or long term housing. It also means that someone has physically moved into their unit. It does not mean 'matched' or 'lease signed'.
- Data must be chronic only.
- Data does not need to be inclusive of their entire chronic population (i.e. can be program or intake specific).

Submitting

- Three consecutive months of data submitted meeting this specific definition.
- Data cannot be all zeroes.
- If submitting bulk reports, the report must be split into individual months in order to achieve title.

Can this title be lost once achieved?

• No, this title cannot be lost.



Some Chronic Inflow / Outflow

Definition


- At least one chronic inflow / outflow data point outside of move-ins must be reported.
- Data must be chronic only.
- Data does not need to be inclusive of their entire chronic population (i.e. can be program or intake specific).

Submitting

- Three consecutive months of data submitted meeting this specific definition.
- Data cannot be all zeroes.
- If submitting bulk reports, the report must be split into individual months in order to achieve title.

Can this title be lost once achieved?

• No, this title cannot be lost.



Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow

Definition


- All six chronic inflow / outflow data-points must be reported unless an exception is allowed by 20KHomes team.
- Data must be chronic only.
- Data does not need to be inclusive of their entire chronic population (i.e. can be program or intake specific).

Submitting

- Three consecutive months of data submitted meeting this specific definition.
- Data cannot be all zeroes.
- If submitting bulk reports, the report must be split into individual months in order to achieve title.

Can this title be lost once achieved?

• No, this title cannot be lost.



Quality Reliable Data

Definition


- Inflow / Outflow data must be within the 15% margin of error threshold for reliable data.
- Applies only to those with Quality By-Name List.
- All six chronic inflow / outflow data-points must be reported unless an exception is allowed by 20KHomes team.
- Data must be chronic only.
- Data must be reflective of 90% of all known chronic population.

Submitting

- Three consecutive months of data submitted meeting this specific definition.
- Data cannot be all zeroes.
- If submitting bulk reports, the report must be split into individual months in order to achieve title.

Can this title be lost once achieved?

 Yes, if a community is no longer in the reliability threshold of less than 15% margin of error, they will move down to *Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow*. They cannot be moved to a level lower than *Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow*.



Quality Balanced Data

Definition

- Inflow / Outflow data must be perfectly balanced (100% balanced or 0% margin of error).
- Applies only to those with Quality By-Name List.
- All six chronic inflow / outflow data-points must be reported unless an exception is allowed by 20KHomes team.
- Data must be chronic only.
- Data must be reflective of 90% of all known chronic population.

Submitting

- Three consecutive months of data submitted meeting this specific definition.
- Data cannot be all zeroes.
- If submitting bulk reports, the report must be split into individual months in order to achieve title.

Can this title be lost once achieved?


 Yes, if a community no longer has perfectly balanced data, they can either move down to *Reliable Data* (if they are within the 15% margin of error threshold) or *Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow* (if they are no longer within the 15% margin of error). They cannot be moved to a level lower than *Complete Chronic Inflow / Outflow*.





By-Name List Scorecard and CAS Scorecard

BNL SCORECARD

- Focussed on having a quality list to know <u>all people</u> experiencing homelessness
- 2 purposes master list for overall system understanding which feeds CAS sub-list(s)
- BNL Scorecard focus is on adding to and updating the BNL and quality of data

Coordinated Access System

CAS SCORECARD

- Focussed on process of getting the right people to the right housing intervention
- CAS Scorecard is focussed on effective CAS operation and matching housing interventions to people on the CAS list



Reducing Chronic Homelessness





Three ways 20KHomes reports publicly on reductions:

1. Below Baseline (3 or more consecutive months at 5%-15% below)



Still Using Run Chart Shifts and Trends to Measure Improvement







- Updating Reduce Description and Q&A
 - Including Final Kilometer (or Final Mile or Home Stretch):
 - Potential to reach functional zero within 6-12 months
 - Proximity to the functional zero threshold (three or less active chronic homeless)
 - Active and engaged with 20KHomes supports
 - High functioning local leadership team
 - Leaders with the interest and will to push towards Functional Zero in the immediate term.
- Create new separate document on Run Charts
- Testing approaches with communities in the Final Kilometer
- Testing "Command Centre" approach





The Last Kilometer *Theory*

1.	Assess interest and will with core local leaders
2.	Deep dive to assess remaining challenges and needed strategies to reach functional zero
3.	Offer additional support from the 20KHomes Team
4.	Convene and connect local leaders
5.	Further refine challenges and opportunities for external support
6.	Local teams refine strategy at Learning Session
7.	Identify partners to provide additional external support
8.	Execute strategy with coordinated support
9.	Review data and adjust strategy


