

GUELPH-WELLINGTON 20,000 HOMES CAMPAIGN

FROM REGISTRY WEEK TO COORDINATED ENTRY IN LESS THAN 12 MONTHS

BACKGROUND

- Guelph & Wellington Task Force for Poverty Elimination
- April 2015 Service-based Point in Time Count (359 individuals)
- 2015 Housing First programme (1 HF worker for adults)
- Community-based response
- 20,000 Homes
- Partnership: Poverty Task Force (PTF) & County of Wellington Social Services

BACKGROUND

- December 2015: Sign on to campaign
- January 2016: 20,000 Homes Leadership Committee
- April 2016: Registry Week (including Community Debrief event)
 - Over a three-day period, 295 individuals were identified as experiencing homelessness in Guelph-Wellington
 - Over 125 volunteers
 - 80 people attend the Community Debrief
 - Media coverage

BACKGROUND

- Additional Housing First worker for adult system
- First Youth Housing First worker for youth system
- Housing First Technical Training & Assistance (Wally Czech)
- OrgCode provides SPDAT training
- Continued to raise awareness & advocate (Push for Change, Speaker's Bureau, Submissions re: Functional Zero, National Housing Strategy, etc.)

GUELPH-WELLINGTON HOMELESSNESS-SERVING SYSTEM: COORDINATED ENTRY SYSTEM



A FAMILY OR INDIVIDUAL IS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS OR AT-RISK OF EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

This includes the following living situations:

- 1. Unsheltered (i.e. sleeping on the streets)
- Emergency sheltered
- 3. Provisionally sheltered (i.e. couch surfing)
- At-risk of homelessness (people whose economic and/or housing situation is precarious or does not meet public health and safety standards)

Coordinated Entry

is a shared and standardized method for connecting people experiencing homelessness to the resources available. Coordinated Entry assesses people's housing-related needs, prioritizes them for resources, and links those in need to a range of types of assistance.

FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS ARE ASSESSED USING THE VI-SPDAT AT A DOOR AGENCY

The VI-SPDAT's a pre-screening, or triage tool that is designed to be used by all providers within a community to quickly assess the health and social needs of homeless persons.

Door Agencies include:

Wyndham House, Welcome In Drop In, Family & Children's Services of Guelph & Wellington County, East Wellington Community Services, Community Resource Centre of North and Centre Wellington, Rural Wellington Community Team, County of Wellington Social Services, Specialized Outreach Services (SOS)

ONCE ASSESSED. FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS ARE ADDED TO THEGUELPH-Wellington By-Name List

A By-Name List is a real-time, up-to-date list of all people experiencing homelessness in our community. BNL's allow communities to know every person experiencing homelessness by name to facilitate decisions around how best to refer individuals experiencing homelessness to housing resources.

THE BY-NAME LIST WILL INFORM REFERRALS TO APPROPRIATE HOUSING SERVICES & SUPPORTS

Families and individuals that are prioritized through the Coordinated Entry System will be referred to the appropriate services and supports through a Complex Clients Working Group, made up of key partners in the homelessness-serving system.

LEADERSHIP

- 20,000 Homes Leadership Committee
 - Phase 1 (January 2016 May 2016)
 - Focus on planning and implementing Registry Week
 - Community Champion, Networker, Transformational Leader
- 20,000 Homes Leadership Committee
 - Phase 2 (June 2016 July 2018) 80% retention
- 20,000 Homes Operations Committee
 - Inform, problem solve, provide wide-direction
 - Homeless-serving system

ABOUT THE 20K CAMPAIGN

Organized by the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness (CAEH), the 20,000 Homes Campaign is "a national movement of communities working together to permanently house 20,000 of Canada's most vulnerable homeless people by July 1, 2018." In 2016, the Guelph & Wellington Task Force for Poverty Elimination and the County of Wellington made a strategic decision to co-lead a local movement to support the 20,000 Homes national campaign.

To keep the movement honest, accurate and continuously improving, the campaign will provide timely and public reporting on our progress.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS: NOVEMBER 2016 – APRIL 2017



BYNAMELIST

The Guelph-Wellington By-Name List (BNL) was originally created using data collected during Registry Week in April 2016. In February 2017, Guelph-Wellington 20K Homes introduced a system to add to and update the BNL, giving our community a real time, up-to-date list of people experiencing homelessness. A BNL helps facilitate efficient decisions around how best to refer individuals experiencing homelessness to housing resources. A BNL can also be used to plan estimations of future rates of homelessness, including inflow and outflow and other performance management targets.

COORDINATED ENTRY SYSTEM

A Coordinated Entry System (CES) is a shared and standardized method for connecting people experiencing homelessness to the resources available.

Working with 8 different Door Agencies, families and individuals are assessed using a common assessment tool (VI-SPDAT). They are then added to the BNL, which informs referrals to appropriate housing services and supports. The Guelph-Wellington CES was launched in February 2016.

NATIONAL HOUSING STRATEGY

A local submission was provided to the Federal government to inform the development of the National Housing Strategy.

HOUSING ON THE

Guelph-Wellington joined housing advocates from across the country to lobby Members of Parliament in Ottawa.



Follow up 5-7	Municipal Housing Help Staff - Connected to financial/community resources, CWL	Community partners assigned as lead to follow up and offer connections.

After Registry Week

- Continued identification of vulnerable individuals and families known to be homeless
 - Identified through Community Partners
 - VI-SPDAT at 14 days
 - 8+ added to the BNL and brought forward to case conferencing
- Homelessness Coordinated Response Team (HCRT)
 - Bi-weekly case conferencing
 - Focus on 8+ individuals and families
 - Make recommendations and decisions on ICM resources
- Collaborative work to improve dedicated resources for housing and supports



20K Homes or PiT Counts



All individuals and families experiencing homelessness are screened with the Vulnerability Index–Service Prioritizations Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT) and directed toward appropriate resources and supports for housing stabilization.







After Registry Week - Challenges

Capacity

- Data management (no HIMS)
- Housing and supports inventory
- Key roles missing

Communications

- What is Coordinated Entry? (and what does it look like here?)
- Difference between the BNL and CWL
- Large scale change to homelessness response

Structure and MOU

- Leadership buy-in and knowledge
- Limited expertise
- Trickle down from leadership to front line

 - Housing Help
 - A Place Called Home
 - Fourcast
 - John Howard Society

- YWCA
- Women's Resources
- Ross Memorial Hospital
- HHHS Mental Health Services

- Common Assessment Tool
 - VI-SPDAT
 - Measures Acuity (Depth of Need)
- By Name List
 - Organized by acuity to know who is the most vulnerable (Microsoft Access)
- Priority Based Matching to Housing and Support Resources









Coordinated Entry Framework Next Steps

- Training of all System Players
 - VI-SPDAT (common assessment)
 - Coordinated Entry process
 - Function of case conferencing

Communication Strategy

- Process is well known
- Clear Pathways for agencies and individuals
- Regular, clear communication of outcomes

Increased partnerships for inventory

- Dedicated housing and support destinations
- Continued landlord engagement and community partnership building
